DEAR MEMBERS, TRADITIONAL OWNERS AND OTHER INTERESTED PEOPLE,

My name is Peter McQuoid and on 17 April 2021 the then Registrar of Indigenous Corporations, Selwyn Button, appointed me special administrator for Adnyamathanha Traditional Lands Association (Aboriginal Corporation) RNTBC (ATLA).

This is my ninth newsletter as the special administrator for ATLA. While I am in this role, I'll send regular newsletters to let you know what I'm doing to help get your corporation ready to hand back to members' control.

Indigenous Business Australia (IBA) continue sale of its share of Wilpena Pound Resort

Just over 10 years ago ATLA 1 Pty Ltd (formerly Crammond) and IBA jointly purchased the Wilpena Pound Resort. The aim of this venture was for ATLA1 to buy out IBA's share of ownership over a 10 year period by using profits generated from operating the resort. Unfortunately 10 years has passed and the goal has not been achieved – currently ATLA1 owns only 11.09% of the resort with IBA owning 88.91%.

The ATLA corporation advisory group gave me clear advice the ATLA1 investment in the resort is of significant importance to the Adnyamathana people. The Wilpena Pound site is of immense cultural significance to the Adnyamathana people. I have written to the Chairperson of IBA and the Minister for Indigenous Australians to request IBA immediately halt the intended sale of IBA's share. I asked for this so that ATLA can consult and seek directions from Adnyamathanha common law holders on whether or not to purchase IBA's share directly or in partnership with others. It is the unanimous view of the ATLA Corporation Advisory Group this sale should be halted.

IBA has responded to my request saying they refuse to delay the sale. I will continue to ask IBA to halt the sale until proper consultation with Adnyamathana people can occur.

Information meeting & annual general meetings (AGMs)

I will be holding 2 meetings in November.

The first is an information meeting which is for corporation members, common law holders and people interested in the special administration. It is an opportunity to hear a report on the special administration and ask questions. This meeting will be held at Hawker on Friday 25 November 2022. For more details see the attached notice of information meeting.

The second will be on the next day, Saturday 26 November 2022 in Port Augusta. This meeting is ATLA's AGM for the years ended 30 June 2021 and 2022 in the same meeting. For more details see the attached notice of AGMs.

At both meetings, I will run through the financial statements for the years ended June 2021 and June 2022, provide an update on the IBA sale of its shares in Wilpena Pound Resort and the ATLA-v-Rangelea court case. It will also be an opportunity for asking questions about the corporation and the special administration.

Tricia Stroud, the Registrar of Indigenous Corporations will be at both meetings and happy to respond to questions.

Media cannot attend these meetings.

Rule book change

On 19 October 2022 I made a change to a rule about member meetings in the ATLA rule book:

Rule 6.8 (1) - The quorum is 10% of members or 20 members (whichever is the greater)

has been changed to :

Rule 6.8 (1) - The quorum is 10% of members or 20 members (whichever is the lesser).

This change will allow AGMs to continue with a minimum of 20 members attending, which was the rule before the special administration started. No other changes to the rules have been implemented.

ATLA Culture Heritage and Native Title committee (CHANT)

The CHANT committee is an advisory committee for the ATLA board. The role of a CHANT committee member is to provide advice on culture and heritage matters to the ATLA board. As there is currently no board, they are providing this advice to the ATLA corporation advisory group. In performing their role, members of CHANT must represent the whole Adnyamathanha community through their knowledge, understanding and awareness of Adnyamathanha culture and heritage.

The CHANT committee is working on 2 potential native title mining agreements (NTMA). The committee:

- has drafted a possible NTMA with BlastIt
- is currently talking to Copar Resources.

A decision about whether or not to enter a native title mining agreement is a high level decision under the Native Title Act. This means that ATLA must consult and seek directions from common law holders for the decision. If and when these proposed agreements are ready to be presented to common law holders, they will be added to the agenda for the next meeting of common law holders.

Other activities requiring recommendations or advice from the CHANT committee include:

- Responding to Form 21 Notices for entry onto Adnyamathanha Land
- Responding to Section 21 and 23 determinations
- Providing advice on preservation of artefacts, access to cultural materials and damage to land
- Providing advice on applications for ATLA membership
- Providing recommendations on the membership of National Parks co-management boards.

The CHANT committee meets once a month. The special administrator does not attend CHANT committee meetings.

ATLA Coordinator

Welcome to Lisa Salisbury from the EBS Group who has taken over from John Ramsay as the ATLA Coordinator. Lisa is a Senior Cultural Heritage Consultant with strong skills and experience in Aboriginal archaeology and working with Aboriginal communities. EBS has been contracted for a period of 12 months starting 1 October 2022.

The role of the ATLA Coordinator is to support the CHANT committee to ensure ATLA culture and heritage interests are recognised and protected.

Thank you and farewell to John Ramsay. John has been supporting the CHANT for over a year now and has during that time provide the CHANT with a professional support service.

Thanks again to the generous funding provided by Heathgate Resources Pty Ltd (75%) and Taruga Minerals Limited (25%), which has enabled the appointment of Lisa Salisbury as the ATLA Coordinator.

Corporation's rules about proxies

Proxies can also speak at meetings and join in demanding a poll. They can vote if their appointment allows them to.

A proxy appointment must contain the appointer's name and address, the corporation's name, the proxy's name, the meeting where the proxy is going, and it must be signed by the appointer. (See attached proxy form).

The corporation must receive the proxy's appointment at least 24 hours before the meeting.

A person must not be a proxy for more than one member.
